Learning Target:

• Students will learn to value and understand diversity and have opportunities to work collaboratively with people who are different than them.

After watching Teen Refugees Show Us What True Friendship Looks Like | Kid President Travel Show Ep4, use the activities within these lesson plan choice boards to promote an appreciation for diversity, unity, teamwork, and compassion in your classroom. The choice boards are designed to offer teachers flexibility. Feel free to select any combination of activities that will work best within your classroom setting.

Remember that offering students choice and voice in the classroom is an excellent strategy to promote ownership of learning. For this reason, you might consider offering several options from the choice boards to students and allowing them to select which activities they will complete.

After students complete the activities, ask them to reflect using the following questions:

- How can we take what we've learned to make our school a space where everyone belongs?
- How can we make our school a place where everyone can be whoever they want to be without judgment?
- How can we enjoy and appreciate each other's cultures every day?
- What greater impact might we have by helping our community one small step at a time?

Use these activities to explore diversity in your classroom, school, community, and world.

Read fairy tales, folktales, or fables from around the world (either from a class text set, or digitally).

Determine the main message/ theme of the story and identify similarities that exist between stories of different cultures. Use <u>Google Earth</u> to explore global communities. Encourage students to identify what makes each culture unique, as well as the similarities that bind them all together.

Recommended Google Earth Voyages:

- This is School: Explore classrooms around the world
- <u>This is Home</u>: Explore homes around the world

Explore print or digital works of art from a variety of cultures and art movements. Choose two different art movements and highlight the art elements depicted. Try creating your own artwork represented by one of the movements.

Go for a walk around your local community and draw or write about examples of diversity among people, places, and things.

Create a playlist of music from around the world and have a dance party! Discuss similarities and differences in the musical elements and instruments used in each song.

Discuss different aspects of life (food, sports, games, family, etc.).

Choose a theme and ask everyone in the class to contribute a photo or drawing of what that looks like in their family/culture. Put images together to create a class collage and discuss or write about how it illustrates the diversity of your classroom.

Research sports and sporting events within your community and/or around the world (Olympics, World Cup, etc.)

Discuss how sports...

- Help people form a common identity

Investigate another culture to learn about the food, family life, demographics, religions, and other aspects of their culture.

You may choose to focus on a culture that is facing war, persecution, or natural disaster and discuss why people/families have to migrate or re-locate.
